

Westminster Larger Catechism

Q. 52. How was Christ exalted in His resurrection?

A. Christ's exaltation in His resurrection began with His body not decaying, since it was impossible for death to keep its hold on Him. On the third day, He rose again from the dead by His own power and in the very same body with all its essential qualities in which He had suffered (but it was not subject to death and the other infirmities associated with this life), and it was truly united to His soul. By His resurrection, He plainly declared Himself to be the Son of God, to have satisfied divine justice, to have conquered death and him who holds power of death, and to be Lord of the living and the dead. He did all this as a general representative of humanity and as head of His church in order to justify believers, to make them alive in His grace, to support them against their enemies, and to assure them that they too will be resurrected from the dead at the last day.

The Westminster Larger Catechism (written in 1600s England) consists of brief questions and answers as a concise confession of the truths of the Christian faith according to the Scriptures. This is a modern English adaptation of the original.
